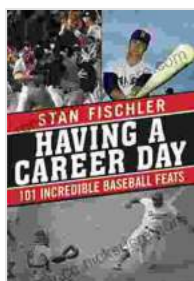

1. Babe Ruth's 60 home runs (1927)

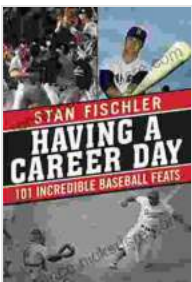
7. Roger Clemens' 354 wins

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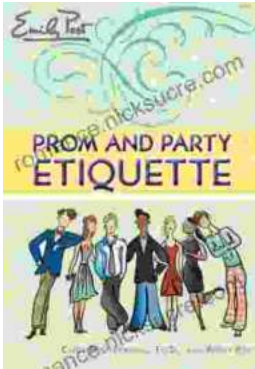
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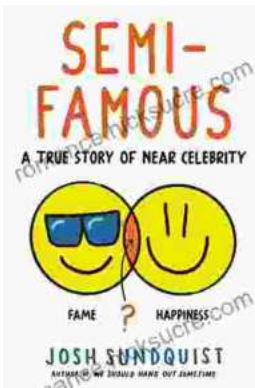
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
