
My Life in a Religious Cult: A Journey of Indoctrination, Isolation, and Redemption

If you see any of these warning signs, it is important to get help immediately. Cults can be very dangerous, and it is important to get out as soon as possible.



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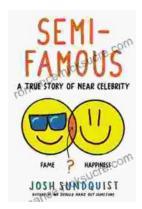
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
